Sheikha Mayassa: Art is very powerful because it has no boundaries

DOHA: In a landmark international TV interview, H E Sheikha Al Mayassa bint Hamad bin Khalifa Al Thant, Chairperson, Qatar Museums (QM, spoke exclusively to CNN International on Qatar Museums' (QM) ambitions and focus on developing arts, heritage and creativity in the country. The interview was a highlight of the launch episode of CNN Style, a new monthly TV programme on topics, including arr, architecture and design, which was launched on Satriaday on CNN International.

She discussed themes, including the importance of investing in culture, QM's focus on nurturing emerging talent, bringing contemporary artists to Qatar and QM's latest exhibition as part of the Qatar China 2016 Year of Culture. What About the Art? Contemporary Art from China.

The exhibition, curated by Chinese artists Cai Guo-Qiang features the works of 15 of China's most significant contemporary artists and is currently on show at the QM Gallery. All Riwa quittle lily 16. DOHA: In a landmark international

On turning Qatar into a "world class destination for culture", she said: "I think for as long as I can rememthink tot as tong as I can relieffi-ber, art has been part of our culture. It has always been part of our iden-tity, whether it's preserving heritage, archaeology, excavation and collect-ing all sorts of art." Launching the Fire Station 'Artist

in Residence' initiative to nurture the talent of young Qatari artists and residents in Qatar.
Sheikan Myassa is credited with transforming Qatar's old Civil Defence building into studio spaces for artists, known as the Fire Station 'Artist in Residence' initiative, which is part of QM's strategy to nurture emerging aleget and inspire an inflorenus culture. talent and inspire an indigenous culture of creativity and innovation. The initiative, which began in September 2015, spans a period of nine months and offers studio space and mentoring and tutoring for 20 artists from a range of different disciplines, including art, photography, design and architecture. QM created the Fire Station as an artist hub to support the local creative community to encourage an exchange

between artists, and to perpetuate the budding landscape through local production and creativity.
Shekha Maysas said: "We're trying to bring the best of the best from around the world or the most influential people to think in creative ways, because creative people come up with the best solutions to times of change.
We have invested a lot in education. We have invested a lot in education, and culture was the second thing we

invested highly in." On bringing some of the world's leading contemporary artists to Qatar, including Takashi Murakami, Damien Hirst, and Cai to inspire future generations of artistic talent and engage the local community, she said: "Most contemporary art is provocative. And a lot of people say for good art to be good,

it should be provocative. We are very clear with the artists that you are free to decide on your exhibition, but you are not free to be insuling to our culture or traditions."

The interview also explored Cai's exhibition. Following the huge success of his solo exhibition Cai Guo-Qiang. Saraab at Mathaf in 2011, Cai has returned to Qatar as a curator to present the exhibition featuring contemporary Chinese artists and collectives born in Mainland China.

On QM's longstanding relationship with Cai, she said: "Cai is a very generous artist. When he came here for his Saraab exhibition in 2011, he was here for about two and a half months, working with students.

"He became so famous walking around the city that everyone would call him by his first name bringing art from China is quite important or us given that the art scene there is growing very rapidly so it's really an exchange of knowledge. We're really excited to have something of this calibre:

Art as a bridge between cultures that connects entities in Qatar and the world.

OU seminar explores cell therapy for diabetes

DOHA: Qatar University Biomedical Research Centre organised a seminar on the use of stem cells to treat diabetes. The event on 'Phuripotent stem cells as tools for disease modelling and cell therapy in diabetes' was delivered by Dr Essam M Abdelalim, scientist, Qatar Biomedical Research Institute, and Assistant Professor at Hamad Bin Khalifa University (HBKU).

He said with diabetes as the most prevailing disease with progressive incidence worldwide and no permanent treatment available yet, cell therapy might prove to be the best approach to treat type I and severe cases of type 2 diabetes.

According to him, transplantation of pancreatic islets is used to restore the functional cells in diabetic patients, but the shortage of human donors and the occurrence of immune rejection lead to search for other sources of pancreatic cells. He said recent studies indicate that stem cells are likely to be accepted as a therapeutic tool for diabetes. "Pluripotent stem cells (PSCs), including embryonic stem cells (ESCs) and induced pluripotent cells (ESCs) are considered prom-DOHA: Oatar University Biomed

cells (ESCs) and induced pluripotent cells (iPSCs) are considered prom-ising approaches to study diabetes. ESCs/iPSCs have a high capability to differentiate into insulin-producing cells, which are closer in nature to in-vivo cells than those differentiated from other types of stem cells. "iPSCs can be generated directly

Dr Essam M Abdelalim, scientist, Qatar Biomedical Research Institute, and Assistant Professor,

from diabetic patients, providing cells genetically identical to the patient to be used for in-vitro disease modelling and eventually cell-based therapies. Several IPSC lines have been produced from patients with different forms of diabetes and most of these are able to differentiate into insulin-producing cells; he said. He said IPSC could provide personalised treatment to the particular characteristics of each patient, but

characteristics of each patient, but before PSCs could be considered a tool for regenerative medicine to treat diabetes, additional in vitro and in vivo studies are needed, as the patient safety is the most impor tant issue to be considered. He also discussed advances, challenges and future perspectives of using iPSCs as a promising tool for disease mod-elling and cell therapy in diabetes.
